



- (1) Survey to be conducted January 2015.
- (2) Consists of total annual expenditures divided by Certificate of Qualifications issued during the fiscal year. It indicates annual resource-use efficiency.
- (3) An indication of the value attached to the primary system outcome by its two customer groups. Survey based measurement on a 100-point index.
- (4) The number of employers or organizations acting in the role of apprentice-sponsor.
- **(5)** An indication of the value attached to apprenticeship and sponsorship outcomes by sponsors of apprentices. Survey based measurement on a 100-point index.
- (6) This measure had been based on continuation by participants in Foundation programs.
- (7) A weighted average of both apprenticeship and foundation program post-secondary seat utilization, reflecting percent of ITA-funded seats filled by registered participants.
- (8) Secondary School Apprenticeship program registration rule was changed in January 2014 to comply with the province's definition: students are considered to be youth up to the end of the current school year in which they turn 19 years old. Prior year results have not been restated.
- (9) Completion rate is a measure of the number of apprentices who have completed their program and obtained their Certificate of Qualification within 6 years of registration. The completion rate is calculated quarterly and then reported on a cumulative basis throughout the year.

New Apprenticeship Registrations by Industry Training Program Fiscal* 2014/15 – Registered June, 2014


