

(1) An indication of the value attached to apprenticeship and sponsorship outcomes by sponsors of apprentices. Survey based measurement on a 100-point index.

(2) The number of employers or organizations acting in the role of apprentice-sponsor. In August 2015, ITA has improved its methodology to track youth participating in trades training programs and as a result, those sponsors who had been attached to the youth ACE IT program are no longer counted in this measure. In addition, ITA's activities to encourage apprentice completion have decreased the sponsor count as some employers are no longer sponsors once their apprentices become certified.

(3) Top 10 Trades in Demand (with Foundation programs) are: Carpenters; Heavy Equipment Operators (except cranes); Electricians (except industrial and power system); Welders and related machine operators; Steamfitters-Pipefitters; Sprinkler System Installers; Construction Millwrights and Industrial Mechanics; Heavy-Duty Equipment Mechanics; Plumbers; and Bakers.

(4) Data Source: Canadian Council of Directors of Apprenticeship (CCDA), New West Partnership, Pan-Canadian Apprenticeship Mobility Protocol.

(5) Is an indication of the value attached to the primary system outcome by its two customer groups. Survey based measurement on a 100-point index.

(6) This measures the percentage of individuals who successfully complete a Foundation program and become an apprentice registered with the ITA 12 months from their Foundation credential achievement date.

(7) Secondary School Apprenticeship program registration rule was changed in January 2014 to comply with the province's definition: students are considered to be youth up to the end of the current school year in which they turn 19 years old. Prior year results have not been restated.

(8) A weighted average of both apprenticeship and foundation program post-secondary seat utilization, reflecting percent of ITA-funded seats filled by registered participants.

(9) Completion rate is a measure of the number of apprentices who have completed their program and obtained their Certificate of Qualification within 6 years of registration. The completion rate is calculated quarterly and then reported on a cumulative basis throughout the year. In the 2009/10 fiscal year, ITA implemented new software that enabled better tracking of apprentices from the modular welding program and cohorts from that program are now included in completion rate tracking.

(10) As a result of the new Welder Foundation program, training spaces provided through the former Welder C program are now counted in the Foundation spaces rather than counted in the Apprenticeship training spaces. Prior year results have been updated for consistency.



Note:

 The number of active youth apprenticeships measures the number of youth apprenticeships participating in the ACE IT and SSA programs in the reporting period. Total number of active youth apprenticeships (2,926) = youth apprenticeships in ACE IT (1,119) plus youth apprenticeships in SSA (1,906) less youth registered in both ACE IT and SSA programs (99).

In August 2015, ITA has improved its methodology to track youth participating in trades training programs and as a result, future participants in the youth ACE IT program will no longer register as youth apprenticeships. ACE IT apprenticeships will be phased out over the next 12 months and the Number of Active Youth Apprenticeships will continue to represent SSA apprenticeships.
